Preferred candidate for Chief Constable for West Yorkshire Police

Following interviews in June I announced that **John Robins QPM** will be my nominated candidate for the **position of Chief Constable for West Yorkshire**. Mr Robins has been Temporary Chief Constable since December 2018 and has worked in West Yorkshire Police since 1990, first as a Police Constable, working his way up to Chief Superintendent before becoming an Assistant Chief Constable and Deputy Chief Constable. I am really pleased to be making this announcement which will be subject to a confirmation hearing with the West Yorkshire Police and Crime Panel in July where I will look forward to making this recommendation to the Panel members.

Summer drink/drug drive campaign starts

West Yorkshire Police is warning of the consequences of getting behind the wheel after drinking or taking drugs this summer. Motorists should be aware that roads policing officers take action all year round to tackle this inconsiderate and dangerous behaviour. There is a breathalyser kit in every police vehicle in West Yorkshire and officers also now routinely use drug testing kits. Last summer 54 people failed a breath test at the roadside while 59 people were arrested for driving whilst under the influence of drugs. If you know of anyone driving whilst unfit through drink or drugs then please report them to West Yorkshire Police as soon as you can. In doing so you will be helping to keep our communities safe and possibly even saving lives as a result. West Yorkshire receives over £3m for Violence Reduction Unit (VRU)

We are receiving a further £3.37m allocation to help tackle violent crime. This is in addition to the £4.02m 'surge' monies already awarded since May this year as part of the £100m funding pot announced by the Home Office in March. Additional funding for these issues is of course to be welcomed. I have long since advocated a whole system public health approach to reducing violence in our communities and the new investment in establishing Violent Crime Reduction approaches is an important step forward. It also further builds on a host of projects we are already doing across the county with partners to intervene earlier and help address the causes of serious crime and violence before it escalates. However the funding from Government needs to be sustainable over a longer period if it is to have a real impact. It is essential that funding beyond this first year is found as part of a Government priority within the forthcoming spending review. I have been keen to see this funding arrive as soon as possible as we are already 3 months into this financial year and it's very frustrating that it has taken this long. I will continue to highlight the need for a long term whole system approach by Government, which needs to be put in place and properly supported at all levels. [Find out more](#)

Chair of the Association of Police and Crime Commissioners (APCC)

As part of my work as the Chair of the APCC last month I met with Her Majesty's Prison and Probation Service. I then went on a Serious Violence Working Group where I continued my work nationally to tackle violent crime. I also met with Revolving Doors Agency, a charity who are looking to reduce the amount of people trapped in the cycle of offending, to discuss the use of short custodial sentences. Finally I spoke at this year's Cumberland Lodge Annual Police Conference which had a specific focus on gang crime. My speech centred around the need for early intervention and prevention across a range of service to safeguarding vulnerable young people and divert them to positive pathways.
